Organisational context	For over 50 years WWF has been a leading voice for nature. We are the world's largest conservation organisation, working in 100 countries and with over 5 million supporters. WWF-Australia is the 7th largest member of the WWF Network. We work with governments, businesses and communities on environmental issues with a single mission: to build a world where people live and prosper in harmony with nature. We have our foundation in science and we work towards a sustainable planet, striving to conserve biodiversity in Australia and throughout the Oceania region. Behind the scenes of our on-ground conservation projects are teams of scientists, policy and communications experts, lawyers and other specialists, all supported by our regional and national staff members. Purpose of job	The position designs and project manages WWF's priority forest landscape restoration initiatives, drawing upon leading science and best practice stakeholder management. The position will specifically lead the development and implementation of a holistic landscape restoration project, catalysing large-scale ecological restoration of forests and woodlands on cleared, degraded and burnt landscapes in the NSW

	Northern Rivers region, titled 'Koala Bounceback'. A unique feature of this role, and central to the restoration project, includes leading WWF's 2019/20 bushfire response, to address wildlife trauma and improve wildlife care via project partners to design and build a new wildlife hospital within the region.
Key accountabilities	 Project manages WWF-Australia's priority forest landscape initiatives: Leads the design & implementation of a multi-million dollar 'Koala Bounceback' forest landscape restoration & wildlife conservation program in & adjacent to the Richmond Valley in the Northern Rivers Region of New South Wales. Contributes to WWF's strategic goals on landscape restoration, bushfire recovery & forest carbon sequestration & abatement. Engages with the WWF International Network Forest Practice, to provide support & knowledge exchange Supports the uptake of policy positions relevant to biodiversity, threatened species, food production & climate change. Secures expert advice across relevant disciplines (e.g. WWF Eminent Science Group) to ensure inclusion of climate adaptation & mitigation considerations across program design. Provides technical input into the development of funding applications. Integrates & collaborates with key conservation staff with a focus on supporting restoration efforts in the bushfire recovery zone of southeast Australia. Ensures that results-based management is used to monitor and evaluate conservation impact. Actively & constructively participates in WWF-Australia's integrated Ways of Working, supporting co-content creation & leading the adoption of digital multimedia approaches that foster supporter engagement, mobilisation, and income generation.
Job level responsibilities	 Contributes to WWF's strategic/operational goals on landscape restoration, bushfire recovery and forest carbon sequestration and abatement. Contributes to strategic and/or operational planning, systems, processes, delivery and reporting. Complies with legislation, standards, policies and practices, particularly advocacy with excellence, information security, WH&S, child protection, security, sustainability, privacy, EEO, and the Environmental & Social Safeguarding Framework (ESSF). Aligns own work with WWFs mission, Guiding Principles, Brand and I-KODE Values – Acts with Integrity, Knowledgeable, Optimistic, Determined and Engaging. Seeks approval from the CEO for international travel. Performs administration, risk and quality management, and reporting. May supervises staff/volunteers ensuring aligned performance, motivation and recognition. Represents WWF as a technical expert within discipline, as a spokesperson and presents to groups.

Job Challenges	 Securing support and action among key decision-makers and land managers for saving and growing trees in response to the bushfires. Ensuring integration to deliver optimal organisational outcomes. Trialling innovative methods for cost-effective large-scale landscape restoration, such as direct seeding from vehicles and drones and other emerging technologies. Anticipating media, supporter and community reaction to issues and tailoring positions to leverage opportunities and achieve positive outcomes. Securing donor confidence whilst ensuring agility in programmatic planning.
Essential selection criteria	 A track record in developing & leading implementation of forest landscape restoration initiatives. Experience in multi-disciplinary stakeholder management, such as facilitating effective partnerships with farmers/graziers, landcare groups, government land management & conservation agencies. Experience in forest/land carbon sequestration & abatement. Knowledge & experience in effective techniques for revegetation with assisted natural regeneration, protection of regrowth vegetation, tree planting, drone- or vehicle-based direct seeding, regenerative agriculture & carbon farming. Programmatic & financial management experience. Experience working in a cross-cultural environment & the cultural context when working with Aboriginal or other Indigenous peoples. Project management skills, including design, monitoring & impact assessment. Well-developed networks across the conservation science community. Excellent interpersonal, written & verbal communications skills, with an ability to communicate research findings & technical concepts to scientific & lay audiences. An ability to work constructively in a flexible team-based environment.
Desirable selection criteria	 Expertise in project management (i.e. Open Standards for the Practice of Conservation). Experience living or working in land management, carbon farming or nature conservation in rural & regional communities. Familiarity with Australian Government's Emissions Reduction Fund, Queensland Land Restoration Fund or similar programs. Understanding of species conservation issues, including key threats & relevant policy frameworks. Experience working with Indigenous communities in combining traditional knowledge & western science. Experience in supporting fundraising for conservation initiatives. An understanding of, & support for, workplace sustainability principles.
Credentials	Tertiary qualifications in nature conservation, environmental management and/or equivalent experience
